Originally published in 1974, a comprehensive history of Nigerian Education, from early times right through to the time of publication, had long been needed by all concerned with Education in Nigeria, students, teachers and educational administrators. No one was better qualified than Professor Fafunwa to provide such a book, and in doing so he gave due emphasis to the beginnings of Education in its three main stages of indigenous, Muslim and Christian Education. Nigerian Education had been considered all too often as a comparatively recent phenomenon, but this book points out from the start that 'Education is as old as Man himself in Africa' and that both Islam and Christianity were comparative newcomers in the field. A historical treatment of these three strands which have combined to make up the modern Educational system was vital to a clear understanding of what was needed for the future, and most of the first half of the book is concerned with these Educational beginnings. The imposing of a foreign colonial system on this framework did not always lead to a happy fusion of the systems, and the successes and the failures are examined in detail. There was no shortage of documentary evidence in the form of reports and statistics during the decades prior to publication, but this evidence was frequently

scattered and inaccessible to the student, so that the author's careful selection of key evidence and reports, often drawn from his own personal experience, will be invaluable for those wishing to trace the development of Education in Nigeria up to the early 1970s. A knowledge of the history and development of the Nigerian Education system, of the numerous and intensely varied personalities and beliefs which have combined and often conflicted to shape it, is indispensable to all students in colleges and universities studying to become teachers. It is this knowledge that Professor Fafunwa set out to provide, drawing on his wide experience as teacher writer and educationalist.

Public Examinations Examined

Educational Planners have long recognised that the curriculum is one of the key factors in the educational process and that changes in the curriculum constitute an essential step in the achievement of educational objectives. At the Seventh Commonwealth Educational Conference in Accra in 1977, although the need for curriculum reform was recognised, it was suggested that the curriculum situation had not basically altered in many member countries. In order to obtain an accurate picture, a recommendation was therefore adopted that a survey should be undertaken on recent curriculum reforms in secondary level institutions in Commonwealth member countries. This publication presents the results of that survey. It was presented to Ministers and their officials at the Eighth Commonwealth Education Conference in order to assist their discussions on curriculum developments and also to member countries of the Commonwealth in the hope that it will be a valuable link in the chain of Commonwealth educational efforts. The report is broadly in three sections. The first attempts to identify and describe the trends and changes which have emerged in the last decade or so in curriculum control, planning, design and content. The second section highlights particular initiatives, programmes and projects which member countries have reported and the many problems and issues which have emerged in their development. The third section records specific areas in which co-operation between Commonwealth countries exists and potential areas for future co-operation.

The Circumcision of Women

This study focuses on the local and regional impact of large-scale gold mining in Africa in the context of a mineral boom in the region since 2000. It contributes to filling a gap in the literature on the welfare effects of mineral resources, which, until now, has concentrated more on the national or macroeconomic impacts. Economists have long been intrigued by the paradox that a rich endowment of natural resources may retard economic performance, particularly in the case of mineral-exporting developing countries. Studies of this phenomenon, known as the "resource curse,"[†] examine the economy-wide consequences of mineral exports.¹ Africa's resource boom has lifted growth, but has been less successful in improving

people's welfare. Yet much of the focus in academic and policy circles has been on appropriate management of the macro-fiscal and governance risks that have historically undermined development outcomes. This study focuses instead on the fortune of local communities where resources are located. It aims to better inform public policy and corporate behavior on the welfare of communities in Africa in which the extraction of resources takes place.
