Jennifer Allen shares the balance leaders struggle with, as they strive to support and honor the fine practices of teachers, even as they nudge colleagues to improve their literacy instruction. Ultimately, *Becoming a Literacy Leader* is a hopeful book, an optimistic and realistic portrait of life in schools among teachers committed to doing their jobs well.
